Stormwater Rules Tightened...or Not

As we've told you <u>before</u>, the Department of Conservation and Resources has new restrictive stormwater regulations in the pipeline. Just this past Monday, the <u>Virginia Soil and Water Conservation Board Meeting</u> approved them for implementation. And then <u>suspended them</u>.

The story is that the DCR wants a little more time for <u>public comment</u>, for which they set the period of Oct. 26 to Nov. 26. The board will meet again on Dec. 9. Spokespeople don't expect any substantive changes in <u>the rules</u>, but the debate between consumer and business groups has been intense. The last chance comment period is likely to be, as well.

The DCR is now part of <u>Federal effort</u> to coordinate planning and action on behalf of the Bay cleanup. On October 2, EPA and state officials briefed Virginia stakeholders on the <u>process for developing a new Bay cleanup plan</u>. They may have no choice but to ratchet up the regulations and shut polluted runoff down. The General Assembly might have a thing or two to say about the implementation next January, as well.
