

POINTERS FOR WITNESSES IN COURT OR DEPOSITIONS

- 1. Tell the truth.
- 2. Listen to each question and **pause before answering**.
- 3. Speak one at a time (only one person can be heard by the court reporter or on speaker phone, etc.).
- 4. Answer only <u>the</u> question asked.
- 5. **Do not volunteer more information** than the question required.
- 6. If asked how you prepared, it is ok to say you discussed the case with your attorney. If asked what your attorney told you to say, respond by calmly stating "<u>He said to just tell the truth</u>."
- 7. Be careful not to be inconsistent!
- 8. Your attorney cannot coach you but will make legal objections or assist where needed and permissible.
- 9. If your attorney objects, **wait for him to finish objecting** and for the Judge to then make a ruling (or for the attorneys to agree) before answering or not.
- Do not answer a question you do not understand.
 If you do not understand a question, politely <u>but</u> firmly, say so.
- 11. If you do not remember something, say so. **Do not guess or make it up instead**.
- 12. Ask to see any document or photo, etc., being referred to, if needed to refresh your memory.
- 13. Ask for a break any time needed to get a drink of water, use bathroom, etc..
- 14. Take as long as you feel necessary to **think**. Don't worry about pleasing the questioner. Ignore their faces.
- **15. Do not lose your temper** or argue with the questioner. *They might be purposely trying to make you angry.*
- 16. Ask to correct any misstatements you realize you may have made.
- **17.** Watch out for "leading" questions <u>or</u> trick "yes/no" questions.
- **18.** If the question is phrased as compound (2-questions-in-1) ask for it to be **re-phrased** or broken down.
- **19.** Be cooperative but **not too helpful**. Let the other side make their own case.
- **20.** Remember this is adversarial, even if they are friendly, anything said can be used against you or your case. Do not be fooled by a humorous, smiling or helpful approach. It could be a tactic.
