However, if you intend to stay in your new home for a number of years, you will recoup the cost of making the energy efficient changes and your home will be more comfortable – cooler in summer and warmer in winter. If you save energy usage by certain percentages based on implementing some of the changes that will be suggested, the government may give you a rebate or a tax credit, further reducing the cost of making your house more energy efficient. In the meantime, your electric and heating bill will go down, saving you money.

Find an independent energy audit company that is not trying to sell you products. They will be working for your benefit, not the benefit of any company that is looking to make a buck off of you.
