The South Carolina Bar Lawyer Referral Services offers a referral to a person by the area or location needed and by the type of law.

If you contact the service by telephone, you will be asked to provide a brief explanation of your possible legal situation. You will also be asked the county in which you are seeking a lawyer. If you access the program online, you will select the county and the type of law, then type a brief explanation of your legal situation.

The lawyers signed up with the service are all in good standing with the South Carolina Bar, have been practicing for a minimum of 3 years, and must maintain malpractice insurance coverage. The lawyers also agree to offer a 30-minute consultation for no more than \$50. Thereafter, the fees will be the lawyers' normal fees.

This packet is provided by the South Carolina Supreme Court and is intended to help a person file for a simple divorce without an attorney. It is designed for people who meet **all** of these criteria:

- Filing for divorce on the ground of 1 year continuous separation without cohabitation
- Have no marital property **or** have reached an agreement on how to divide marital property
- Have no marital debt or have reached an agreement on how to divide the marital debt
- Have no children and none are expected **or** have minor children and have reached an agreement regarding custody, visitation, and child support that meets the minimum requirements as set by the South Carolina Child Support Guidelines
