Financial management and policy – and the President's and Republicans' contrasting approaches thereto – were this week's top issues. Early in the week President Obama introduced his \$3 trillion deficit reduction plan, which included proposals to raise taxes on the wealthiest income earners and bring about reforms to Medicare and Medicaid. The President's move, which Republicans criticized as "class warfare," signaled a notable shift to a more defiant political approach to Republicans, which served to reinvigorate his core base of Democratic and liberal supporters. On Wednesday we learned that Republican leaders in the House and Senate President's clean energy agenda and the huge hit it has taken since the failure of California solar company Solyndra.

The latest on the Hill and in the country . . .

In a vote of 59-36 the <u>Senate today blocked a stopgap budget plan passed by the House</u>, creating an impasse that could result in a government shutdown. Senate Majority Leader <u>Harry Reid (D-NV)</u> offered a compromise measure.

Yet as a government shutdown may be on the horizon, <u>lawmakers nonetheless leave town for the</u> weekend to do campaign fundraising.

As the third-quarter fundraising deadline approaches, <u>Obama campaign sends out email in major push for "unparalleled" campaign</u>.

(We find it fitting, by the way, to mention that our phones have been ringing with U.S. Senators calling and asking for last minute contributions to close out the third quarter.)

In a party-line vote of 249-169, the House today passed Republican-sponsored legislation that would set up an interagency committee charged with <u>assessing the impact of Environmental Protection Agency rules on U.S. economic competitiveness</u>.

<u>Solyndra executives invoked the Fifth Amendment</u> today during questioning at a hearing of the House Energy and Commerce Subcommittee on Oversight and Investigations.
