U.S. Focuses On IP Protection Failure In Foreign Markets, Requests Comments

In December 2012, the United States Trade Representative ("USTR") released the results of its Out-of-Cycle Review of Notorious Markets "<u>Notorious Markets Review</u>"), identifying more than 30 marketplaces dealing in infringing goods and services and facilitating global piracy and counterfeiting. USTR issued a <u>Request for Public Comment</u> concerning the acts, policies, or practices of foreign countries that deny adequate and effective protection of intellectual property rights ("IPR") or deny fair and equitable market access to U.S. persons who rely on intellectual property protection under Section 182 of the Trade Act of 1974 (referred to as "Special 301"). In a press release issued by USTR, United States Trade Representative Ron Kirk commented on the direct relationship between intellectual property protection and the U.S. economy by noting that "piracy and counterfeiting, including online sales of pirated and counterfeit goods, is a problem that hurts the U.S. economy, harms some of this nation's most creative and innovative

On December 18, 2012, USTR Ambassador Ron Kirk and U.S. Commerce Department Acting Secretary Rebecca Blank commenced a two-day <u>meeting</u> with Chinese Vice Premier Wang Qishan held in Washington, DC. This meeting between U.S. and Chinese officials was the twenty-third such encounter under the rubric of the Joint Committee on Commerce and Trade ("JCCT"). The USTR also issued a report on China's WTO compliance the same month. More »

- Russia's New Meat Certifications Raise WTO Concerns Raising their first concern under WTO rules after the passage of permanent normal trade relations between the United States and Russia, USTR Ron Kirk and Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack issued a statement in December over Russia's ban on beef and pork imports containing ractopamine.
