1. Immigration: Bipartisan immigration reform as we know it is dead. Many of the GOP congressional newcomers ran on toughon-immigration platforms, promising stepped-up enforcement without any pathway to citizenship for immigrants living illegally in the United States. Without the support of key GOP leaders, including Texas Republican Sen. John Cornyn, there is no chance for any bipartisan compromise that would include a guest worker program and earned citizenship. And in Austin, key Republicans they favor an Arizona-style law to combat illegal immigration in Texas.
