It's been quite a week in Washington and across the country. After weeks of political wrangling and posturing a <u>compromise debt ceiling deal was finally reached</u> at the eleventh hour, giving the President borrowing authority through 2012. However, <u>markets remained uneasy</u> after the debt ceiling vote as economic realities set in. And as Congress got over one impasse they hit another, causing a nationwide outcry as they <u>failed to refund the FAA before leaving for summer recess</u>, leaving the federal government unable to collect \$1.2 billion in airline passenger taxes for five weeks (and all of it over a disagreement about a \$16 million subsidy cut provision). Finally, the buzz about which members of Congress will be on the new Super Committee that will be responsible for coming up with \$1.2 trillion in debt savings cuts is <u>spurring an increase in</u> lobbying activity, since the Super Committee's membership will be a key to predicting which programs will be cut and which will be spared.

The latest on the Hill and in the country ...

The <u>Senate passed a bill this morning to re-fund the FAA</u>, ending the shutdown that would have put thousands out of work.

Good news with a positive jobs report showing <u>unemployment rate dropped to 9.1%</u> in July as 117,000 jobs were added.

A New York Times/CBS News <u>survey</u> released yesterday revealed <u>a 57% disapproval rating for</u> <u>House Speaker John Boehner</u>'s (R-OH) job performance. The survey also revealed 72% of Americans disapproved of the way House Republicans handled the debt ceiling crisis, while 66% disapproved of Democrats' role. The President received a 47% disapproval rating for how he handled the debt ceiling negotiations.

President Barack Obama today announced a new initiative to help <u>unemployed veterans find jobs</u> in the private sector.

Defense Secretary Leon Panetta says the new <u>debt bill's "trigger" provision is an unacceptable</u> <u>"doomsday mechanism,"</u> says "common sense must prevail" in Congress.
