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Lien Law Unlikely To Change-Yet

For those of you following the <u>proposed revisions to the NC lien law</u> that is currently at the NC House Judiciary Subcommittee B, a quick update: <u>the proposed bill (HB 489)</u> is unlikely to be voted on this legislative session due to its unpopularity with several constituency groups, including both the AIA-North Carolina and the NC Home Builders Association.

According to NC Bar Association <u>Construction Law section</u> chair, Nan Hannah, a vote is unlikely in this legislative session. However, there is the potential for a study commission to continue the conversation and discuss alternative lien law changes that might satisfy all constituents.

Such a study commission will only occur is Subcommittee Chairman Paul Stam hears from those in the industry that such a study commission is desired. In addition to the Construction Section of the Bar, the <u>American Subcontractors Association of the Carolinas supports the idea</u>, as do other industry groups.
