

Big Events and Personal Injury Law

Events such as concerts, performances and festivals oftentimes draw a lot of people into a small place. In these circumstances, the property owner is responsible for making sure that the situation is safe overall. There are going to be instances, of course, where somebody attending the concert goes out of their way to make it unsafe for everybody involved. Still, the property owner is charged with making sure such situations are taken care of. Trampling

Traveling becomes a real hazard when too many people are allowed into a venue. It's always a hazard when there are congested conditions in a concert venue but, when there are far too many people crammed into far too small a space, the problem is magnified. If you were injured in an incident where you were trampled by a crowd and there was no security there to stop it or to help you, you may have a premise liability claim on your hands. If a member of your family was killed in such an instance, you should definitely speak with a lawyer.

Violence

Some venues tend to get a bit violent. When you have a combination of a rowdy crowd, alcohol and people who are looking for trouble, it is inevitable that a few fights are going to break out. If the premises are notorious for constantly having violence problems, they are at risk of being held liable for damages. If you were attacked and injured in such a location, or even one where you had no reason to expect the crowd was rowdy, you may want to speak with an attorney. Sometimes, it can be found that the owner should have provided security to diffuse the situation.

Incompetent Security

Bouncers, as one would expect, are usually pretty big people. Part of their job is to intimidate the crowd into not causing any trouble. Some of them are very good at what they do and can remove a person from the premises without causing them any injury but while still communicating the message that the person is anything but welcome at the premises. If a bouncer has injured you, speak to an attorney. Competent security is necessary at some venues but incompetent security is always a serious issue.
