Ignoring Needs

Because of this, they sometimes end up being ignored by staff members who are not committed to offering any real professional level of care. In such cases, they may end up coming down with infections or suffering other maladies that are the direct result of being ignored altogether.

Missed Medications

Some people in nursing homes are alert and mobile enough to go up to the nurse's window or interact with the staff enough to bring it up if they happen to miss a dose of a needed medication. Unfortunately, some of the people in nursing homes have very compromised memories and may never notice if they stopped taking a certain medication that they need. This can ascend to the level of abuse when it starts to have a negative impact on the person's life. Some medications are life-saving and need to be used on a regular basis. A wrongful death may end up occurring if somebody is not given the proper medication on the proper schedule at the nursing home.

Stealing

Because people in nursing homes sometimes suffer from dementia and other conditions that cause delusions, particularly delusions of persecution, claims that they are being stolen from or otherwise abused may go ignored. This is one of the most dangerous scenarios for people in nursing homes. When they are no longer being taken seriously, it's much easier for people to abuse them.
